

Alaska Association of Student Governments Resolution # 4 WWAMI Funding Submitted by: Eagle River High School

## Be it resolved by the Alaska Association of Student Governments

- 1. Whereas, WWAMI stands for Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana, and Idaho;
- 2. Whereas, WWAMI has five primary goals, which include:
  - a. providing publicly supported medical education
  - b. increasing the number of primary care physicians, especially in underserved areas
  - c. providing community-based medical education
  - d. expanding graduate medical education (residency training) and continuing medical education
  - e. providing all of this in a cost-effective manner;
- 2. Whereas, students who enter the program are dual enrolled at UAA and the University of Washington School of Medicine and complete 18 months of medical school;
- 3. Whereas, Alaska gets 20 seats in the program, receiving about 90 applicants each year;
- **4.** Whereas, WWAMI allows Alaska's medical students to train all four years in their home state, with their first two years at the UAA campus;

- **5.** Whereas, the third and fourth years of medical school is comprised of "clerkship" rotations in different medical specialties;
- 6. Whereas, these clerkships can be taken in any five of the WWAMI participating states, however, students who take the "Alaska track" can take nearly all of these in Alaska;
- 7. Whereas, WWAMI is a medical school program, not a premedical program;
- **8.** Whereas, Alaska has a shortage of physicians; specifically primary care, psychiatric care, and emergency medicine;
- 9. Whereas, Alaska needs 60+ physicians each year to meet demand;
- **10. Whereas,** WWAMI contributes 14+ physicians each year to help meet this need;
- **11. Whereas,** the baseline physician requirement in the United States is 291 physicians per 100,000 people;
- 12. Whereas, all five participating WWAMI states do not meet this requirement;
- **13. Whereas,** Alaska only has 264.3 physicians per 100,000 people;
- **14. Whereas,** according to Foundations Alaska WWAMI interim director Megan Ritter, no other school in the nation supplies as many physicians as the Alaska WWAMI program;
- **15.** Whereas, according to UW's Suzanne Allen, Alaska has the fourth-best return rate for medical school students, behind only Texas, California, and Wyoming;
- 16. Whereas, since its creation in 1971, almost 500 Alaskans have gone on to become physicians;
- **17. Whereas,** getting physicians to come to Alaska and stay is a big problem; however, through the WWAMI program and its five-state partnership, students from other states get the chance to visit and work in Alaska;
- 18. Whereas, the State of Alaska funds the WWAMI loans;

- **19. Whereas**, the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education (ACPE) provides approximately \$11.2 million or 579 WWAMI loans;
- 20. Whereas, about 55 percent of WWAMI borrowers are licensed physicians practicing medicine in Alaska;
- 21. Whereas, the state pays about half of the tuition for Alaska students in the program;
- 22. Whereas, graduates who don't return to Alaska are required to pay the state back;
- **23.** Whereas, Alaska Gov. Mike Dunleavy has proposed cutting nearly \$3.1 million in state funding for the WWAMI program, which means a 100% reduction in state funds for the second through fourth years of students' medical education;
- 24. Whereas, if cut, it would make it difficult for the program to survive;
- 25. Whereas, if cut, Alaska will be the only state to not fund education;
- **26. Whereas,** until the state's budget is balanced, the funding for the WWAMI program should be cut by 50%;

**Therefore be it resolved by the Alaska Association of Student Governments,** that we as a collective group support a 50% cut of the WWAMI program in Governor Dunleavy's fiscal year 2020 budget, rather than the proposed 100% cut.
